General information

South Korea

South Korea, officially the Republic of Korea (ROK) and often referred to as Korea, is a country in East Asia, located on the southern half of the Korean Peninsula. Also known as the "Land of the Morning Calm", it is neighbored by China to the west and Japan to the east, bordering North Korea to the north. Its capital is Seoul, the second largest metropolitan city in the world and a major global city. South Korea lies in a temperate climate region with a predominantly mountainous terrain. Its territory covers a total area of 100,032 square kilometers and has a population of over 48 million, making it one of the most densely populated regions in the world. South Korea is a developed country and a full democracy. It is a High-income OECD member, having the fourth largest economy in Asia and the 15th largest in the world. South Korea is the world leader in innovation among major economies and a leader in technologically advanced goods such as electronics, automobiles, ships, machinery, petrochemicals and robotics, headed by Samsung, LG and Hyundai-Kia. It is a member of the United Nations, WTO, OECD and G-20 major economies. It is also a founding member of APEC and the East Asia Summit, and a major non-NATO ally of the United States. In the 21st century, there has been increased interest in Korean culture throughout the world, also known as the Korean Wave.

Seoul

Seoul is the capital and largest city of South Korea. With a population of over 10 million, it is one of the world's largest cities and the second largest mega city in the world. The Seoul National Capital Area, which includes the major port city of Incheon and most of Gyeonggi-do, has 24.5 million inhabitants, larger than the population of Australia, and is the world's second largest metropolitan area. Almost half of South Korea's population lives in the Seoul National Capital Area, and nearly a quarter in Seoul itself, making it the country's foremost economic, political, and cultural center. Located on the Han River in the center of the Korean Peninsula, Seoul has been an important settlement for over two thousand years, with its history dating back to 18 BC, when Baekje, one of the Three Kingdoms of Korea, established its capital in what is now south-east Seoul. The city then became the capital of Korea during the Joseon Dynasty and the Korean Empire. The Seoul National Capital Area includes four UNESCO World Heritage Sites: Changdeokgung, Hwaseong Fortress, Jongmyo Shrine and the Royal Tombs of the Joseon Dynasty.

Seoul's influence in business, international trade, politics, technology, education and entertainment all contribute

to its role as a leading global city. It is considered to be an Alpha World City, ranking 9th in the 2008 Global Cities Index. Seoul is the iconic city of the Miracle on the Han River and hosted landmark international events such as the 1988 Summer Olympics and the 2002 FIFA World Cup. It is one of the world's top ten financial and commercial centers, home to some of the world's largest conglomerates such as Samsung, LG and Hyundai-Kia. In 2005, the Seoul National Capital Area generated a total GDP of over \$460 billion, larger than the economies of Finland, New Zealand and Norway combined. In 2008, Seoul was named the world's sixth most economically powerful city by Forbes.com, ahead of Paris and Los Angeles.

Conference venue

COEX is prominent landmark in Seoul. Located in the central business area, COEX is a destination for business, shopping, entertainment, and more. With a world-class convention and exhibition center, Asia's largest underground shopping mall, restaurants and entertainment facilities, COEX is a great place to go in Seoul.

Currency

The South Korean unit of currency is the won (KRW), with KRW 10, KRW 50, KRW 100 and KRW 500 coins. Notes come in denominations of KRW 1000, KRW 5000, KRW 10,000 and KRW 50,000. The highest value note is worth only US\$10 at the current exchange rate, so you will probably have to carry around a thick wad of notes (USD 1 = KRW 1,134 / as of March 2010).

Tipping

Tipping is not necessary in Seoul, although a compulsory 10% service charge is added to the bill at some midrange and all top-end hotels and restaurants.

Credit cards

More and more upmarket hotels, shops and restaurants accept foreign credit cards, but plenty of places including budget accommodation, market stalls and restaurants require hard cash. Cash payment is still common in Seoul so always have a stash of KRW 10,000 notes handy as it will almost certainly be needed.



Climate

In common with the rest of South Korea, Seoul has a humid continental climate, despite the fact that the country is surrounded by water on three sides. Summers are generally hot and humid, with East Asian monsoon taking place from June until July. August, the hottest month, has an average temperature of 72 °F to 86 °F (22°C to 30°C) with higher temperatures possible. Winters are often very cold with an average January temperature of 19 °F to 33 °F (-7°C to 1°C) and are generally much drier than summers, although there are 28 days of snow in Seoul in each year on average.

Electricity

Electricity is supplied at 110 V / 220 V 60Hz.

Visa

With a confirmed onward ticket, visitors from nearly all West European countries, New Zealand, Australia and

around 30 other countries receive 90-day permits on arrival. Visitors from the USA and a handful of countries receive 30-day permits, while 60-day permits are granted to citizens of Italy and Portugal, and Canadians receive a six-month permit.

About 30 countries - including the Russian Federation, China, India and Nigeria - do not qualify for visa exemptions. Citizens from these countries must apply for a tourist visa, which allows a stay of 90 days.

Letter of Invitation

A formal letter of invitation can be applied for. Such an invitation is only intended to help potential delegates to raise funds or to obtain a visa. It does not imply a commitment from the conference to provide any financial or other support. Time

South Korea Standard Time is 9 hours ahead of Greenwich Mean Time (GMT+9).

Transportation between Incheon International Airport and COEX

Taxi

If you take a taxi from the airport, we suggest that you take one from a designated taxi stand, and ask for a receipt. Luxury taxis are black in color and are higher-priced than the grey-color general taxis. Estimated charges for a taxi from Incheon to COEX are approximately KRW 50,000 (approx. USD 45,00) for a general taxi and KRW 90,000 for a luxury taxi. The passenger will also be required to pay the road toll fee of approximately KRW 7,000.

Shuttle bus

Most visitors choose to take an airport shuttle bus instead of a taxi. We recommend either the KAL Limousine Bus or the Korea City Air Terminal Limousine Bus. Both buses cost KRW 14,000 (approx. USD 13,00), and it usually takes about an hour, depending on traffic conditions. The red KCAT Limousine Bus will bring you to the City Air Terminal at the COEX Center. The blue KAL Limousine Bus goes directly to many 4 and 5-star hotels throughout the city. Note that both the COEX InterContinental and Grand InterContinental Hotels are located at COEX. You can take these buses from the arrivals section at Incheon Airport. Employees at information desks will be happy to direct you to the appropriate departure area.

Conference language

The official language of The 14th World Meeting of the International Society for Sexual Medicine is English. Symposia organised by the affiliated national societies during the first conference day may be held in the respective national language.

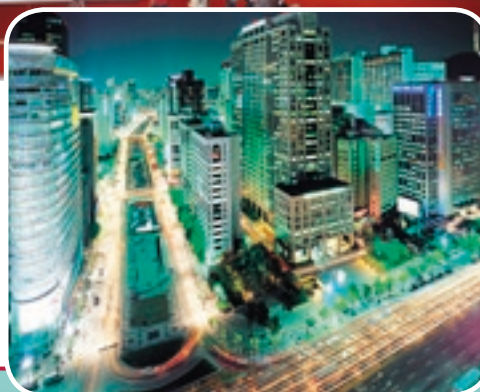

Scientific program

The program for the next meeting of the International Society for Sexual Medicine will be organized around the concept that good sexual health is a portal to good general health. The theme of the meeting will be "Sexual health: a gateway to good health." The scientific program will have a larger representation of sessions devoted to women's sexual health than in past ISSM meetings. About 1/3 of the program will focus on women's sexual health matters while the other 2/3 will focus on men's sexual health matters. Couples' sexual health matters will be covered in both the women's and the men's sexual health sessions. The meeting will start on Sunday 26 September 2010 and conclude on Thursday 30 September 2010. During the five days of the meeting, there will be a daily state of the art lecture given by distinguished experts on topics of major interest; master lectures given by experienced senior members on topics of major interest; round table sessions on current hot topics; interactive sessions in which members of the audience can interact with expert panel members; daily point-counterpoint sessions in which controversies in sexual medicine will be debated; numerous instructional courses; video sessions; podium and poster sessions; a hall for poster exhibitions; sponsored symposia; the biennial session on humor in sexual medicine; a valuable session on the history of sexual medicine; and special teaching sessions on the use of the internet and internet technology, how to write and/or review scientific publications and the basics of medical statistics.

Format descriptions

State of the art lectures:

Each lecture of 30 minutes will be given by a distinguished and renowned expert and will be devoted to a specific topic of major interest.

Master lectures:

Each lecture of 30 minutes will be given by experienced senior members and will be devoted to a specific topic of major interest.



Round tables:

This session will usually last 90 minutes. They will focus on a particular topic and present the very latest data related to it. The round table will include a maximum of 4 lectures and time for discussion.

Interactive sessions:

These sessions will last 45 minutes and present case discussion with a questioner and a panel of experts. Attendees will be given the chance to actively interact with the faculty of the session.

Point counter point sessions:

These sessions will last 30 minutes and be organized to address the controversial issues of a topic. The moderator will allow a brief introduction of each topic by the respective opponents followed by a discussion on the arguments proposed.

Instructional courses:

These 45-minute sessions present a detailed account of a chosen topic. Courses are designed to provide learning experiences that actively involve participants and will include an opportunity for informal exchange with the faculty.

Video sessions:

The video session will last 60 minutes, each video has a duration of 7 minutes including 3 minutes for discussion. A panel of selected experts will present videos showing different techniques and approaches and will discuss the details with the participants.

Podium sessions:

Podium sessions will present the best abstract papers accepted for the congress by the Scientific Committee and will focus on specific topics presenting the very latest findings in this field. Each session will last 90 minutes and will consist of maximum 10 presentations per session. Each presentation is limited to 7 minutes followed by 2 minutes of discussion.

Moderated poster sessions:

Authors will be invited to submit papers on their latest research findings or important ongoing research. The moderated poster sessions will be selected by the Scientific Committee based on a review of all abstract submissions. The most interesting posters are grouped by topics and presented in a 90-minute moderated session. Each session will consist of a maximum of 15 talks in the same general field. Each presentation is limited to 4 minutes followed by 2 minutes of discussion.

Poster exhibition:

Authors will be invited to submit papers on their latest research findings or important ongoing research. Posters will be selected by the Scientific Committee based on a review of all abstract submissions. The poster exhibition will be scheduled from Monday to Wednesday.

Sponsored symposium:

Symposia will be organized by the industry in consultation with the Scientific Committee.

Humor in sexual medicine:

This 30 minute session has become a tradition of ISSM meetings. Slides and videos which poke fun at sex and sexuality will give the audience a short break from serious science.

Guided poster tour:

The tour of the unmoderated posters will be guided by senior clinicians and researchers who will point out the important features of selected posters. Authors will be encouraged to attend the guided tour so that they can be present when their own posters are discussed.

CME accreditation for European and American delegates

MANAGEMENT AND OUTCOME OF PRIMARY VAGINISMUS

Objectives: To access the success rate of treatment based on Masters and Johnson's sex therapy, and the factors affecting success rate.

Material & Methods: In this prospective study, 120 couples of unconsummated coitus due to vaginismus were enrolled. Clinical diagnosis was made first after detailed history taking and clinical examination. A questionnaire regarding characteristics of vaginismus was finished after face-to-face interview before treatment and 3 months and 12 months later. Sex therapy based on Masters and Johnson's method was done. Treatment results were then analyzed.

Results: After therapy, 93.3% of vaginismic women were successfully penetrated and 83.3% had regular intercourse with orgasm. The abilities to reach orgasm and sexual desire were no less than normal women. There was a correlation between duration of unconsummation and success rate, and also between severity of vaginismus, treatment sessions and success rate.

Conclusions: Because of high success rate, we should encourage vaginismic women together with their partners to accept aggressive management.
